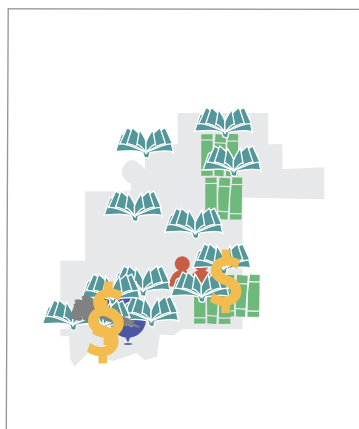


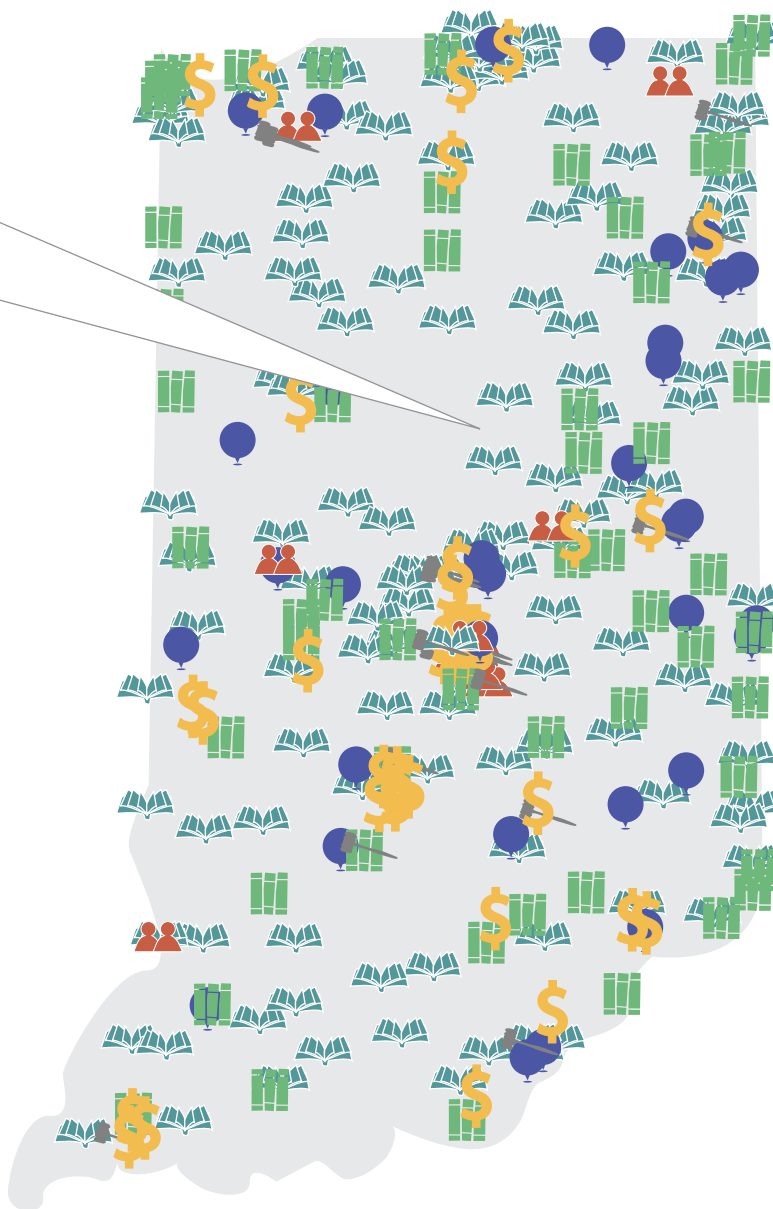

## **RECENT GRANTS AWARDED**

### **The Colors That Surround Us – A Stained Glass Tour**

#### **Anderson Center for the Arts, Anderson - \$1,955**

A survey of 19<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> century stained glass in Madison County will focus on both the works and the structures where they are located. When complete, the survey results will be made available online, and a brochure highlighting the most significant examples will be designed.
