- Statewide read program
- Past statewide reads: Frankenstein (2018); The Year We Left Home (2020)
- Programs to activate community reading and conversation
- Author tour in the fall of the program year

One State / One Story: World of Wonders

World of Wonders

- a collection of essays about the natural world, and how it can teach, support, and inspire us
- connects her experiences as a woman of color living in America with the creatures and plant-life around her
- moves between the curiosity as well as the beauty of the more-than-human and the perspective she receives from that same natural world



Aimee Nezhukumatathil

- Born in Chicago; attended Ohio State; awarded a creative writing fellowship at the Univ of Wisconsin – Madison
- English and creative writing professor at the University of Mississippi
- Poetry fellowship with the NEH; Guggenheim Fellow in poetry



Big Questions

- How do we shape the environment and how does the environment shape us?
- How do human perspectives affect our understanding of the more-than-human world?
- What plants and animals have you related to or had special relationships with?
- How do our relationships with nature affect our actions towards the natural world?

Community Read Program

What is the Community Read?

- Series of three programs about World of Wonders
- One of the three programs is a book discussion
- Hosted by libraries, schools, civic organizations & other nonprofits
- Programs occur during 2022



Resources

- \$750 grant
- 30 copies of World of Wonders
- Program Guide with tips, resources & requirements

Funding

\$750 to support program expenses

- Scholar or book discussion leader payment
- Materials for activities
- Film or ebook licenses
- Marketing or promotional materials
- Space rental
- Food & drink (up to 10%)
- Staff time (up to 10%)
- More books!

Requirements

- Host three programs during 2022
- One program must be a book discussion
- Signed agreement letter and DUNS number
- Submit event calendar to receive first 90% of grant
- Plan and execute three events
- Submit final report to receive final 10% of grant

- Speakers Bureau talk from IH catalog
- Read-alike series
- Community conversation
- Panel discussion
- Writing or art-making activity tied to the themes of the book
- Pop-up exhibit
