- Many ways for Hoosiers to participate in the programming

- How can the humanities help us understand our relationship with the natural world?
- How does our understanding of nature affect our actions toward the environment?
- How is environmental change impacting our understanding of humanity's legacy? Are we being good ancestors?

Why this book...

"Throughout the collection, Nezhukumatathil deftly moves between beautiful depictions of the more-than-human and her own experiences, encouraging readers to think through the connections they've discovered with the natural world, and what ones might yet be unearthed."



Collection Overview

- Collection of essays about the natural world, and the way its inhabitants can teach, support, and inspire us
- Each chapter provides a record of her own experience as a woman of color living in America by connecting her life experiences with the creatures and plant-life she explores
- Beautiful illustrations



Community Read How-To

Community Read Goals

- Encourage statewide conversation about a theme through a literary text
- Bring people together using literature as a vehicle to talk about their lives and communities
- Provides program planning resources for libraries and other hosts
- Encourages new partnerships between host and other community groups



Community Read Grant

- Program grant to develop a series about World of Wonders
- Hosts receive:
 - \$750 stipend
 - Program Guide
 - Up to 30 copies of the book
 - Fun swag
 - Program logos and other downloadable promotional materials
- Hosts agree to design three programs about the book, one of which is a book discussion
- Programs must be completed by December 31, 2022, and final reports must be turned in by March 31, 2023.

Grantee Requirements

- Not-for-profit
- Complete all requested documentation and reports
- Complete three (3) programs, one of which is a book discussion
- Use approved logos and credit Indiana Humanities in all of your external communications, printed fliers, and posters about the program

Requesting Your Funds

- When you have the dates and times of your events set, fill out the **Community Read Event Calendar**. (linked on the resource page)
- Calendar submission triggers your first payment.
- Indiana Humanities prefers e-payment (you will get an email from Tim Murphy - CFO at a bill.com email address to set up the payment details.)
- If you request a check will arrive in 3-4 weeks via mail.

Please use this form to notify Indiana Humanities of the schedule of events you are presenting as part of your One State/One Story Community Read of *World of Wonders*. The event calendar is due at least three weeks before the start of your first event. Descriptions that you provide here will be posted to the Indiana Humanities online calendar of events.

Upon submission of your event calendar and your signed agreement letter, Indiana Humanities will send the first \$675 (90%) of your Community Read mini-grant.

Please note: you are required to host at least one book discussion. It does not have to be the first event of your series, though it is listed first on the form below.

Completing Your Program

- After you complete all your programs, fill out the final budget (no receipts necessary) and final report forms.
- Upon completion, you'll receive the last 10% (\$75) of the grant.
- Information you'll be asked to report back:
 - In-kind / out-right contributions
 - Attendance at each program
 - Your reflections on events (quotable quotes, etc.)
 - Photos / press coverage

Sample Budget

- Account for all \$750 of grant total in column 1
- No receipts needed
- Report matches
 - in-kind (donated materials and services)
 - out-right (cash donations or materials purchased with other funds)

About Community Reads

A Community Read is a series of three or more programs that explore the themes and ideas of Aimee Nezhukumatathil's *World of Wonders: In Praise of Fireflies, Whale Sharks, and Other Astonishments.* Taking place at up to 30 locations throughout Indiana in 2022, at least one of the programs offered is a book discussion, because there's nothing better than talking about great books with curious people. Other events might be speaker programs, community conversations, exhibits, hands-on activities and more.

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Funds \$750 grant provided in two installments (90% / 10%)

Approved Uses

- Speaker honoraria
- Speaker travel
- Book discussion leader honoraria
- Additional copies of book
- Large print or audio copies of book
- Read-a-long titles for younger readers
- Program materials
- Marketing and publicity
- Room reservation fees
- Equipment rentals
- Snacks for programs (not to exceed \$75 total)

Non-Approved Uses

- Prizes or scholarships
- Political action or advocacy
- Religious practices or training
- Creation or performance of art
- Social services
- Construction or renovation
- Property or major equipment purchases
- Publication of books
- Operating expenses
- Alcoholic beverages
- Entertainment (unless it's a key educational component of the program)

What worked last time...

- You can do more than three programs, but should you?
- Think about finding (and paying!) a facilitator for the book discussion.
- Audiences valued in-depth, conversation-based programs (and we do too!).
- Partnerships can be transformative, and last far beyond the program series.
- Your excitement is contagious!



Read-a-likes for Youth

- Read-a-like book lists for Early Literacy, School Age, and Teen
- Two broad themes are covered for all three levels – the Natural World and Moving to a New Country.
- There are SO many books that you can use with this theme. Here's a quick peek into two of them...



Programming for Youth

- Four program ideas for each age group
- Generally, there are two about Nature and two about Moving to a new country
- Nature Peak: Nature Scavenger Hunt
- Moving to New Country Peak: Pack an Imaginary Suitcase
- The Collaborative Summer Library Program is about Oceans this summer... a GREAT Tie-in!

- Work with speaker for any presentation / workshop needs
